#### INTRODUCTION

The Western Region Social Service Forum (WRSSF) was established with the goal of facilitating integrated human development in social, educational and environmental aspects. The forum functions essentially to promote all activities aimed at the development of the marginalized sections of society. Its main objectives are the following.

- ★ To promote noble values and facilitate integrated human development.
   ★ Train personnel for promoting development and education.
   ★ Promote activities connected with ecological and environmental concerns.
- Organize a documentation centre.

The Western Region includes the three states of Gujarat, Maharashtra, Goa, the Union territories of Daman and Diu and four districts of Madhya Pradesh.

#### MEETINGS

#### I - Sixth General Body Meeting 2006-07

The Sixth Annual General Body Meeting of the WRSSF was held on 18th July 2006 at Sarvodaya, Goregaon (E), Mumbai. At this meeting, the resignation of His Eminence Ivan Cardinal Dias as a member of the Governing Body and Trustee was accepted. The new Governing Body was elected and was also accepted. The new Governing Body Members are:

#### II - Governing Body Meetings

Two Meetings of the Governing Body were held, one at Sarvodaya, Goregaon (E), Mumbai and the other at Pilar, Goa.

 The first Governing Body Meeting of the Western Region Social Service Forum for the year was held on July 18, 2006. Six trustees were present. At this meeting the statements of accounts and the annual reports of the year 2005 - 06 were presented and were passed by the trustees and later were presented to the General Body.

 The second Governing Body Meeting of Western Region Social Service Forum, at Pilar, Goa, was held on December 2, 2006 wherein the budget for the financial year April 1, 2006 to March 31, 2007 was presented and approved.

The resignation of Fr. Rocky Banz as Hon. Secretary and Fr. Patrick Lemos as Hon. Treasurer of the WRSSF was accepted and in their place, the new Office Bearers were appointed viz. Fr. Francis Dabre from Vasai Diocese as Secretary and Fr. C. C. Jose of Rajkot as Hon. Treasurer of WRSSF to take effect from April 1, 2007. It was also decided that the WRSSF does not require a full time Forum Director at present. The resignation of Most Rev. Archbishop Stanislaus Fernandes SJ as the Chairman of WRSSF was accepted. Archbishop Filipe Neri Ferrao was appointed as the new Chairman of the Western Region Social Service Forum and Archbishop Abraham V. as the Vice Chairman of the Western Region Social Service Forum.

#### III - Meeting with the DDSWs and Gender Coordinators

 The meeting of the Diocesan Directors and Gender Coordinators with Archbishop Filipe Neri Ferrao was held at Sarvodaya, Goregaon (E), Mumbai on 17<sup>th</sup> July 2006 from 5.45 to 7.15 pm. p.m. The following points were discussed.

 Archbishop Filipe Neri welcomed the Chairman of the Western Region Archbishop Stanislaus Fernandes as the Secretary General of the CBCI and the newly appointed DDSW Fr. Victor Pais of Gandhinagar Archdiocese.

 An Update on the meeting of the Chairmen and the Forum Directors with Caritas India on 12<sup>th</sup> July 2006 was presented by Fr. Rocky Banz. Caritas India has categorized 158 diocese of India into three groups:

- Underdeveloped Dioceses

- Developing Diocese and

- Developed Dioceses

Out of the 15 Western Region Dioceses, two dioceses from Western Region have been declared by Caritas as Developed Dioceses viz. Bombay and Goa while rest of the dioceses have been declared as Developing Dioceses. Caritas India was planning to organize the next National Assembly of the Diocesan Directors of India at Sarvodaya Mumbai. Dates tentatively scheduled were from 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> February 2007.

 An Update of the Bangalore Meeting with JPD Commission of CBCI - 13<sup>th</sup> July 2006 which was attended by Fr. Rocky Banz, the Western Region Chairman and Director was given. At this meeting the need for stressing on the justice and peace aspect as well as bringing a paradigm shift from need based approach to

- a rights-based approach in the future project proposals submitted to Caritas India or Catholic Relief Services by the Diocesan Directors was expressed.
- The next training program only for DDSWs of the region has been scheduled for 13<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup> March 2007 at Nagpur, The topic chosen be the Rights Based Approach, along with an exposure trip would be held for the Diocesan Directors.
- The Zonal Programmes this year would be on Human Trafficking.
- Mr. Arun D'Souza the Caritas Regional Officer of the Western Region stressed the need for conducting the RDPP (Revised Diocesan Perspective Planning) in the dioceses (except Bombay and Goa) of the Region and to fix the dates for the same.
- The three dioceses namely Amravati, Chanda and Nagpur have been faced with the issues of Farmer's suicides, malnutrition, floods, etc hence Fr. Rocky suggested that these three dioceses could come together to work out a common programme to address these issues in their respective dioceses with partnership and coordination of Caritas / CR5.
- Since the term of Fr. Rocky (Director WRSSF) and Fr. Patrick Lemos (Treasurer) is coming to an end it was strongly suggested by the members present and Caritas India for appointing a full time Director for WRSSF. This appointment of the Director would be taken up at the Western Region Bishops Council meeting.
- The meeting of the Diocesan Directors with Archbishop Abraham V. was held at Bishop's House, Nagpur, on 13<sup>th</sup> March 2007.
  - Fr. Rocky Banz welcomed Archbishop Abraham as the newly appointed Vice Chairman of the Western Region Social Service Forum, the newly appointed Secretary - Fr. Francis Dabre, the Treasurer - Fr. C. C. Jose who will take over the Western Region Social Service Forum from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2007, Fr. Baptist Lopez representing Fr. Andrew Rodrigues of Vasai Diocese, who will take over as new Diocesan Director from 1<sup>st</sup> June 2007 and Fr. Francis Fernandes from the Daman Mission. Archbishop Abraham chaired the meeting.
  - Mr. Arun D'Souza, the Western Region Caritas India Officer, explained in brief, the new division of Dioceses according to the Projects of Caritas India. The Integrated Development for Empowerment and Action (IDEA) Projects would be implemented in Poona, Chanda, Sindhudurg, Vasai, Kalyan, Amravati and Nagpur Dioceses. IDEA Projects henceforth would work by networking with the NGOs and the Religious Congregations situated within the diocese to address all the social issues. The Community Enhancement Projects (CEP) will be implemented in Nashik and Aurangabad Dioceses, which will focus more on training programmes to build the capacity of the staff. These dioceses will then move towards the IDEA Project. Mr. Lourdes Baptista will be the

consultant for these projects in the Western Region. With regard to Goa and Bombay Dioceses, projects will be sanctioned but not under the IDEA or CEP.

 Ms. Lorraine, the Gender Coordinator of WRSSF, then explained about the next project on Human Trafficking that was sent to CRS for funding. This project would be implemented at the diocesan level in the local languages where the training programmes would focus on basic awareness, forming of vigilant groups, rescue, rehabilitation and repatriation.

 The next Capacity Building Programme, on Rights Based Approach (RBA) will be held from 16<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> July 2007 at Sarvodaya, Mumbai. The General Body Meeting will be held on 17<sup>th</sup> July from 3.00 pm. to 5.00 pm. The Diocesan Director, Gender Coordinator and one Social Worker are expected to attend this programme. It was also decided that besides the two Regional level Programmes, there would also be four Zonal Programmes on RBA.

A warm farewell was given to the His Grace Archbishop, Filipe Neri Ferrao as
Vice Chairman in absentia, Fr Rocky Banz as Director and Fr. Patrick Lemos as
Treasurer of the Western Region Social Service Forum. A hearty welcome was
given to the new team: His Grace Archbishop, Filipe Neri Ferrao as Chairman,
His Grace Archbishop Abraham as the new Vice Chairman, Fr. Francis Dabre as
the new Secretary and Fr. C. C. Jose as the new Treasurer of the Western
Region Social Service Forum. His Grace Archbishop Abraham stressed that
visits to the Dioceses by the Secretary / Treasurer will be done only if there
are clear-cut programmes.

3) The meeting of the Gender Coordinators was held on 17th July 2006 at Sarvodaya, Goregaon (E), Mumbai. The following points were discussed.

A recap was conducted on the day's programme on Evaluation. All felt that the
programme so far was very informative, well presented, and they gained new
insights. They also felt that the most successful or best run programme of
most dioceses were the Women Empowerment programmes. Therefore Gender
Coordinators should be involved in the decision making process and
implementation rather than just imposing empowerment programmes on them.

 Planning for future Human Trafficking Programmes at the zonal level was discussed.

The question WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE GENDER CO-ORDINATOR was
again taken up at the meeting by the members who expressed a strong feeling
that Gender coordinators were often ignored by the Diocesan Directors and
were not involved in the decision making process. After much discussion, Ms.
Lorraine then suggested that those Gender Coordinators who experienced the
above, should meet their respective Bishop and Diocesan Director and clarify
their roles.

#### WORKSHOPS

#### I - HUMAN TRAFFICKING

 A three day residential program was organized at each of the 4 zones viz. Konkan, Marathwada, Vidarbha and Gujarat. The purpose of these workshops was to conduct awareness programs for different target groups viz. Gender Coordinators, social workers and heads of church-based community centres/ organization.

- Identification of Vulnerable Groups.
- Process of Human Trafficking (recruiting, transporting, transferring, harboring and receipt of persons
- Concept- Migration & Human Trafficking.

The Western Region Social Service Forum organized a two-day workshop on Evaluation on 17-18th July 2006 at Sarvodaya, Goregaon (E), Mumbai. The facilitator was Mr. Lourdes Baptista. At this workshop all the dioceses presented their work done in the social field and towards the fulfillment of the Diocesan Perspective Plan. All the DDSWs in collaboration with the Gender Coordinators presented through power point, the work done by each diocese and at the end, all felt that it was a great exercise in looking back the achievements and the problems faced while implementing the various programmes.

Finally, suggestions were made that there is still greater need for us in taking up the following issues in the Western Region much more intensely.

- **★** Education
- **★** Environment
- → HIV/ AIDS

Positive elements shown in all the Dioceses:

Mr. Baptista made his concluding remarks by praising the participants of the strategies made well use of. He persuaded them to be clearer in their objectives, to divert their works towards creating a community of Justice, Peace and Equality and to involve in more of rights based activities and Advocacy.

#### I. REVISED DIOCESAN SOCIAL PERSPECTIVE PLAN

The Revised Diocesan Social Perspective Plan was conducted in various Dioceses of the Region. These workshops were conducted by the WRSSF team with Caritas Regional staff.

- Nashik Diocese on the 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> November 2006
- Amravati Diocese on the 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> December 2006

Ahmedabad Diocese conducted the Revised Diocesan Social Perspective Plan in collaboration with WRSSF and CRS on the 27th & 28th July 2006.

#### II. HUMAN TRAFFICKING WORKSHOPS

The Gender Coordinator was invited by different organizations as a Trainer to conduct workshops on Human Trafficking. A module for Human Trafficking Sessions has also been prepared by her. During the year 2005-06 she has been invited to conduct awareness sessions on Human Trafficking by the following organizations:

- 1) The Salvation Army
- 2) The AICUF Students
- 3) Youth of Goa
- 4) PSOL Congregation
- 5) YCW

#### III. ISSUE ON FARMERS SUICIDE

A special meeting was organized at Archbishop's House, Nagpur on 12th March 2007. There were 15 members from: Caritas India, Western Region Social Service Forum, the Archdiocese of Bombay, AFPRO, DDSWs of Vidarbha and staff of NMSSS. This meeting was chaired by Archbishop Abraham of Nagpur. In his introduction, Archbishop Abraham mentioned that it was our concern for the farmers that has brought us here together. The facilitator of the meeting was Mr. Manavalan of AFPRO, who mentioned that though the government has a lot of packages for the farmers, the NGOs are not included in its implementation.

Then Fr. Jolly shared the ground realities of Amravati Diocese, where five out of six most affected districts belonged to this diocese. In a study with CASA in August-September 2006, 20 families of Amravati, Akola and Yavatmal districts were visited, to find out the causes of suicides. From the study, analysis and through the observations, the reasons for high suicides are:

- (1) High investment and low productivity
- (2) Failure of agro businesses
- (3) Non availability of Govt. schemes
- (4) Lack of irrigation facilities
- (5) Natural calamities (floods / droughts / hailstorms / delayed monsoons)
- (6) Fall in the agricultural products
- (7) Use of chemical fertilizers (99% of farmers use this)
- (8) Use of costly hybrid varieties of seeds (like BT cotton)
- (9) Absence of loan facilities / low interest, external finance for agriculture activities. (Now the government has given facilities but previous loans still exists).
- (10) Improper finance management (farmers do not budget)

- (11) Over burden of previously taken loan repayment
- (12) High interest rates of money lenders
- (13) Absence of off-farm / alternative income generation activities (No viable
- (14) Absence of proper land development activities (Traditional methods, no water harvesting, barren land)

#### Socio-cultural reasons are:

- (1) Joint family system
- (2) Family disputes/misunderstanding
- (3) Poor health, handicaps, aged parents
- (4) Large number of children (average 4-5 children per family)
- (5) Expensive education of children (Many loans taken in the name of farming is spent on marriages, education, etc).
- (6) Social bondages, customs and practices
- (7) Expensive religious customs and practices (Even if they have no money they take loans and spend on festival celebrations like Holi, Diwali)
- (8) Superstitious practices

The suicide have been committed by both the young and old men and women. Similar situation also exists in the two districts of Chanda Diocese namely Wardha and Chandrapur and two districts of Nagpur Diocese namely Gondia and Bhandhara.

#### Perspectives of Women.

The women are the most exploited and over worked. They now have to work in the fields not only to support the family but often to repay the large loans taken by their husbands. During the chillies plucking season event, the schools are closed so that the children could work in the fields plucking and earn Rs. 30 to Rs. 50 a day. Women and young girls are the worst effected and sexually exploited at all levels.

In order to address this issue on an emergency basis, the following organizations will take up various responsibilities.

- ARPRO technical support
- CARITAS INDIA- funds
- WRSSF Capacity Building Programmes and Coordination
- DDSWs of Vidarbha Zone Implementation of the various programmes connected to the issue and documentation.

Future Plan: The Core Group consisting of the 3 DDSWs, a representative of Caritas India, AFPRO, CRS and WRSSF would meet next at Yavatmal to visit few homes of the affected area and draw up a plan of action according to the needs of the people.
